It is a privilege and a blessing for me to be serving as the Director of the Saint Raphaela Center in Haverford. This wondrous and serene place invites me daily to feel inspired in my ministry. Caring for the property, with its acres of natural beauty allows me to marvel at God's handiwork. Looking after the rooms and their furnishings at the retreat house and the House of Hope in order to create a prayerful and welcoming space for our guests brings me great joy and the desire to make our home a place of refuge for those seeking God.

More than that, though, my ministry gives me the chance to move forward in creating programs and retreats for our prospective visitors - for example reaching out to the homeless population, caregivers, seniors and retirees to take part in our offerings. My ministry calls me to work for Catholic Legal Services in the Archdiocese of Miami where I represent immigrants who are attempting to obtain legal status in the U.S. When the U.S. government wants to deport them, I advocate for them before the Immigration Court to argue that they remain in this country legally. They are extremely grateful and appreciate receiving this help from the Church through me. I have won many cases for the immigrants whom I have served at a most important stage of their lives, enabling them to live in the U.S. legally. Religious sisters do not just spread the Gospel through God's words, but actually do so by helping to meet the NEEDS of others. The beneficiaries of this outreach come to experience God's love through religious sisters in the Church. Every time I win a case in the court or in the Immigration Office, or with the Department of Homeland Security, I know it is God's hand at work.

In my thirty-three years of ministry I have helped many people from a variety of nations including Africans, Eastern Europeans, Europeans, Asians, Mexicans, South Americans, and others. I find this ministry is unique in the way that it enables me to help those whose countries of origin do not have a Handmaid presence To prepare for their cases I have to read and study the condition of that particular country. In one of my last trips to El Salvador, I was happily assigned to play with the children in Las Delicias. That morning, when Rosa interrupted us, we were engaged in one of their favorite activities - creating all kinds of colorful bracelets with a great assortments of beads. Rosa took me to a corner of the room and asked me for help. *"My busband,"* she said with no emotion in her voice, *"was killed last month."* I told her how very sorry I was to hear that. *"Don't be sorry, Sister,"* Rosa said. *"My busband used to abuse me and my boys; please, don't be sorry for him."*

"A few days after my husband was killed, I took my boy friend home with me," Rosa continued. "But my eleven-year-old boy didn't get along well with him. So my son took a knife, and ran after him." Rosa called the police and since that incident, the boy has been in a juvenile facility. Her older son, a thirteen year-old, is in another facility for doing drugs. "And my boy friend," Rosa reported without any trace of sadness in her face, "a couple of days ago was accused of stealing corn, and is awaiting trial in another prison." Rosa needed money for her monthly pilgrimage to those three sites.

Rosa's story has weighed heavily in my soul for all these months. How privileged I was - I am - to have been able to listen to her story!

And with a heavy heart, I went back to the beads.

"It was truly God's initiative that I entered with the Handmaids ten years ago while being fully aware that I might never use my nursing skills again in a congregation whose main ministries have always been education and spiritual accompaniment. Now in retirement, I am blessed to be with young children each afternoon in the Extended Day Program at Ancillae-Assumpta Academy. In this after school program I help the children with their artwork - coloring and making small projects. I love art as a way to prayer and I love to see God in the faces of these little ones. In their presence, watching their smiles and listening to their stories - teaching them to share with one another, I realize that I am responding to God's word. A recent visit to Peru awakened in me a new sense of gratitude, hope, and purpose, as I took part in a conference of the ACI Family sponsored by the Province of Peru-Bolivia. Sr. Dora Vasquez, one of the members of the international commission of the ACI Family, invited me along with one of our Miami Associates to be part of the encounter. We were 112 participants - some sisters, but the majority of whom were lay persons. From the moment I arrived, when Sr. Vicky Barreda, the Provincial of Peru-Bolivia greeted us, I knew that this visit was going to be special. What I did not know was that it was going to be in many ways transformational.

The theme was based on the ACI Family Going Forth: Caring for our Common Home and Serving the Most Disadvantaged. The presenters were members of the ACI Family from Peru- Bolivia who shared with us many things, some of the most revealing being the testimonies of their experiences at the international conference held in Spain, where they met other members of the ACI Family. Their stories touched my heart, and I felt overwhelmed. What was most significant and meaningful to me was seeing the lay members of the ACI Family and their desire to wholeheartedly take part in our Handmaid mission. Yes, I thought, there is so much to do - but we have so many others who want to join in our efforts. That simple realization gave me courage and hope. It renewed my spirit for doing God's work and I remember thinking over and over... We are not alone; we have God's grace and the loving support of our lay associates!

Before leaving Peru, Sr. Dora, along with attendee Cecilia Portugal, hugged me warmly and expressed their great joy at my presence. They also voiced their gratitude to the USA Handmaids for the help they had been given when their province began. *"When I embrace you, I am embracing the USA Province."* Sr. Cecilia said. I hope to be meeting an unmet need of the Venezuelan exiles to Miami with a Support Group I now convoke, for which I suggested and they liked the name Soy Venezolana (I am Venezuelan!) Venezuela is in a very difficult situation, and everyone in the group has someone back home whom they know is lacking food, water, medicine, and safety as military are on the streets from "another country."

We meet once a month in our Miami home. The families are all professionals, high school and college teachers, an accountant, an engineer, and they are now working in manual labor which is very exhausting for them. The need that I intuited and to which they responded is for Venezuelans to talk among themselves while we have a snack, and then find and strengthen their faith base each time with an Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. I offer a bit of catechesis at the opening of the prayer time, and there are always questions. At prayer, we always invoke Our Lady of Coromoto, one of the patrons of Venezuela. They now feel at home in our home and even if only two families come, it seems to be a relief and joy to them. -Kathleenjoy Cooper, acj

I am just getting my feet planted again in the Province after being away during my juniorate studies (in Madrid, Spain). Last year I had the wonderful opportunity to dedicate an entire year to studying Ignatian Spirituality at the Universidad Pontificia Comillas. I came to the United States in 1961 and when I was learning English I used to say, "*I am very important!*" Being able to communicate in another language was vital to my ministry and gave me a sense of what I needed in order to be useful to others. Since then, I have lived in all the houses of the Province (except Miami) and always felt it was a privilege for me to know and be a part of the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the USA and the wonderful American people.

In 2002, God took me to Athens, GA. There, with three other sisters, I live in the midst of 210 trailers where the majority of people are unauthorized Mexican immigrants. Being able to speak English has become very useful for me in helping these people. It allows me to translate their needs and concerns at physician's offices, in court, and in many other day to day situations. Being able to help our brothers and sisters in need is indeed one of my greatest desires as a Handmaid and something for wheh I am deeply grateful. -Angela Cordero, acj



Last year I was sent by the Province to be part of a number of missions. The year experience had helped me to understand better the global migration crisis. I felt the urgency of the call of Pope Francis to the Church and people of goodwill to respond and to open our hearts and borders to these people who are in dire situations. When I accompanied our volunteers to El Salvador, I witnessed first hand the extreme poverty that forces people to flee. Here we Handmaids try to give hope by building houses and offering scholarships for education. I was also sent to the border between Texas and Mexico where I met and accompanied people seeking asylum in the USA because of the extreme violence and poverty in their countries. I saw in the faces of the parents the desperation of ones who would risk everything for a chance to offer their children a brighter future. There I had the privilege of working alongside many people who recognized this border problem as the Humanity Crisis of our time and chose to stand in defense of the Human Dignity and Rights of immigrants and refugees.

Currently, I live in a trailer park among immigrants who have settled in the States and are working hard to provide for their families in a place that is hostile to them and where they do not have legal status and live in fear of deportation by ICE Raids or for driving without a license. Yet they are grateful to be here and hopeful that their children who are US citizens due to birthrights might be able to live a better life, a life free of violence and poverty. As a religious I feel called to live in solidarity with these brothers and sisters and to be their voice and to advocate for them. As a Handmaid, I continue to hear the plea of our General Congregation XX, that is, to allow the Crisis of Human Mobility to "complicate our lives." -Uyen-Chi Dang, acj

It is four years since I was missioned back to the Philadelphia area, where I am a member of the Wyncote community. We consider the way we relate to one another as we live and work together, part of our ministry. Our home is part of our school, Ancillae-Assumpta Academy. Half of us work directly, in different roles, with the students, faculty, staff, and their families. Other members minister with clients, directees, and companions in a nursing facility. We make time, especially at dinner, to hear about everyone's day. Bringing people's intentions, or their persons, to prayer is a source of unity and connects us with those in need. I look forward to our Friday evening faith sharing as a community. I feel it nourishes us just as community prayer, daily celebrations of Eucharist, and our time of Adorations do. I am grateful to be visiting the refugee family whom we, as a province, are assisting. Once a week the mother of the family and I meet for class in English. Speaking in English is not the only thing we share during this time. Daily, I unite myself to all directly involved with those who suffer because of their realities as refugees. Each weekday, I leave my home on South Broad Street and travel to La Salle University to work as a secretary in the School of Arts and Sciences and the School of Business. These are located in separate buildings and campuses. This is my 25th year at La Salle and I consider myself lucky and blessed to be there. Being in a university environment brings with it a great sense of belonging and one that allows me to interact with students and faculty whose common purpose is teaching and learning. It is gratifying to know that our foundress, St. Raphaela Mary, was inspired to pass along her wisdom in stating "Whatever educates invites our collaboration." Throughout my many years on campus, I have come to find that my role is one that requires collaboration and that a substantial part of my ministry is listening - paying attention to the needs of those with whom I come in contact and trying to serve those needs as best as I am able. I have been involved in the Oasis Católico of Athens (Georgia – USA) for sixteen years. As educators, the Handmaids there instituted an after-school program for primary school children in order to help them do well in school. Our program trains university students from the University of Georgia to work with our immigrant children. Beyond that, our goal is to expose the rich to poverty... in order to eliminate prejudices against unauthorized immigrants, and in order to encourage action to resolve the broken immigration system. This program is very powerful, since by means of the tutoring services, cultures, races, social strata and religious traditions are brought together. The tutors are told that their principal "job description" is not "tutoring" but "healing hearts", since theirs is a healing presence which conveys to the children and their parents that not everyone in Georgia or in the United States is against them. Moreover, this program is a gateway to education about social justice.

At Oasis, we continue to offer religious education to the 2nd and 3rd grade students in their preparation for First Communion. We also prepare parents and godparents for the baptism of their children. As Handmaids we believe that everything we do centers around "education in service of the gospel" and in so doing educating "with love and for love." -Marietta Jansen, acj



A few years ago, after the our community in the Diocese of Atlanta had closed, my ministry brought me to the "City of Brotherly Love." It is in this city with its multi-racial, multi-ethnic neighborhoods that I find myself working to promote the gospel message to the parishioners of two inner city churches located in the South Philadelphia area, St. Thomas Aquinas and Annunciation. For me, it is a gift to be able to teach young children and adults in preparation for the sacraments, and to witness them growing in faith.

It scares me! Rather than credits or debits, assets or liabilities, in the columns of this set of books are the words Love, Charity, Compassion, Forgiveness, Cooperation, Responsibility, and Sharing. Of course you can add to this list.

I am inviting you to take part in my ministry and "COOK THE BOOKS." Add to or subtract from the columns as necessary, knowing that we are all in the same boat with Jesus, and that He is the only one we need to account to. I have found that the longer the cooking process, the better the result will be with God's grace and our prayers. - Asunta Thanh, acj

The words of St. Raphaela Mary resonate in me each day as my ministry calls me to work with Catholic Social Services/Family Services in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. My service is different from other Handmaids in that I assist pregnant women, mostly from Mainland China, with what they need during their pregnancy. Providing pre-natal and pregnancy classes, helping with language translations, and assisting in the application process for Emergency Medical Assistance after giving birth are just a few of the responsibilities that come along with my ministry.

With the recent closing of Hahnemann Hospital, and before having their health care transferred to Jefferson Hospital, many of my clients experienced great anxiety. Understandably, navigating the health care system is often a challenge for the most capable individual. But when facing language barriers and the normal apprehensions that accompany pregnancy, it is an even greater difficulty. I saw God's hand leading me to listen to their fears and to help them. -Cam Banh, acj

The **National Religious Retirement Office** provided a grant of \$39,595.25 for retired sisters.


The **PHA Interdiocesan Fund for Religious** provided a grant of \$5,232 for retired sisters.
