Handmaids Saluted With Their Name in Lights

Driving into center city Philadelphia on the Schuylkill Expressway from points north and west, it was hard not to notice the message that shone through the darkened sky on March 29, 2014. Actually, the words had been in place for three days prior, adding to the anticipation and excitement of its message, *The Handmaids of the Sacred Heart Legacy Gala.*

Since 1976, PECO has been displaying messages atop its headquarters at 23rd and Market Streets. Now known as the PECO Crown Lights, the displays have become a symbol of recognition for countless local community and non-profit organizations.

For a community of women religious, whose core values include simplicity and humility, seeing their Congregation's name in lights may have suggested an inexplicable irony. They are, after all, quiet, prayerful women, many of whom work with little or no compensation or recognition.

To those who know the Handmaids and have witnessed their ministries in action, however, seeing the lighted message merely underscored the credit and acknowledgement they deserve.

For almost ninety years, the Handmaids, who have ministries in Philadelphia, Haverford, and Wyncote, along with Miami, FL and Athens, GA, have quietly, but consistently extended themselves to the mission of their Congregation, offering education in service of the Gospel. Not limited to schools, the Handmaid belief, "whatever educates invites our collaboration", has often taken them into uncharted waters. An international community, (it was founded in Spain and is now a presence in twenty-four countries throughout the globe), the Handmaids work largely with immigrant populations, educating and assisting with legal, social, and financial issues. Their retreat center continues to open its doors to all faiths and religious denominations for prayerful contemplation and healing. In 2002, they began a mission in El Salvador and have since established there a library and study center, a clinic, a center for the elderly, and homes for the poor.

Following their fiat, the Handmaids answer the call — wherever needed — to serve a broken world with compassion, hospitality, and joy (the other three of their core values). For this and so much more, with or without lights blazing, their legacy is saluted! (*Photo credit: Savaria Photography*)

Guests at this black-tie event sampled sumptuous appetizers during the cocktail reception and browsed through a unique silent auction that offered a beautifully presented array of gifts, coordinated by Handmaid Advisory Board members, Rodie Alvaré Henson and Susan Singer. A formal sit-down dinner and brief program followed. Emcee for the evening was longtime Handmaid friend and former La Salle University English professor, Dr. Jack Seydow. Reverend Dan Joyce, S.J., Assistant to the Vice President for Mission and Identity at Saint Joseph's University, offered the invocation.

The Legacy Gala paid tribute to the legacy of the Handmaids with an on screen projection of hundreds of photos highlighting their ministries from 1926 to the present. The photos documented the many varied undertakings the sisters have responded to, including those of the present day thirty-seven sisters who oversee five communities in the U.S. The legacy of the Handmaids was also remembered in the program and advertisement book, designed and coordinated by Handmaid Advisory Board member, Carol Angelo. It included the names of every Handmaid who served in the U.S. Province, beginning with Srs. Virginia Vivanco and Gabriela Dillon, the first to emigrate from Spain to establish the Handmaids' first ministry in West Philadelphia.

Special recognition, however, was reserved for Sister Elizabeth McCoy, who until her death exactly ten years earlier

(March 29, 2004), spent more than thirty-five years as the principal and later Director of Ancillae-Assumpta Academy (AAA), the Wyncote school founded by the Handmaids in 1945.

In a video documentary filmed by Bradley Digital and edited and produced by Michael Dondero, AAA '02, guests were given the opportunity

to witness the life and legacy of Sr. Elizabeth. Interviewed for the project were Handmaids, colleagues, friends, and former students. Their recollections of the dynamic and charismatic woman were poignantly articulated, and lauded Sr. Elizabeth's visionary leadership, her affinity for collaboration, and all that she gave to the world as a Handmaid, educator, and friend.

Special guests attending the event included nearly all of Sr. Elizabeth's nieces and nephews and their spouses, along with other family members. As a tribute to their "Aunt BJ" and honoring a long held tradition of the McCoy family, niece Carolyn Braithwaite organized the family's efforts in baking for each guest a homemade scone, one of Sr. Elizabeth's trademark hospitality gifts. A note sharing the symbolism and significance of the scone accompanied each gift.

SISTER CECILIA MARKS 50 YEARS



On Mother's Day, Sunday May 11, 2014, Sister Cecilia Tong celebrated her Golden Jubilee as a Handmaid of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Many friends attended as well as Handmaids from the Philadelphia and Wyncote communities. Reverend Daniel Joyce, S.J. presided at the liturgy with concelebrants Reverends Anthony Quinn and Joseph Dang, and Deacon David Schaffer. The liturgy

used Vietnamese and English in the proclamations of the Word, the music, and the homily by Father Dang. The homilist developed three themes with respect to the life of Sister Cecilia: the Good Shepherd guiding her first dramatic steps toward the Handmaids, Consecrated Life, and Mother's Day with its jubilee invitation to consider a Handmaid's spiritual leadership and pastoring. There have been many opportunities in Sister Cecilia's life to extend motherly love to refugees, families and immigrant Vietnamese religious congregations. Sister Cecilia has been instrumental in nurturing, protecting, and instructing many hundreds of persons across the United States in their struggle to adapt their lives to many new ways.

Currently, Sister Cecilia is on the staff of Saint Raphaela Center, active in hospitality in center programs, and in developing connections with the Vietnamese communities of PA and NJ and reconnecting with the Vietnamese congregations of Sisters across the U.S.

Handmaids Elan Intermediate Meeting

The Intermediate Meeting of the Handmaid Congregation will take place from September through October, 2014, in Haverford. This meeting, which is governed by the Handmaid Constitutions, is held during the five-year interval between two General Congregations. Its function is solely consultative, and is attended by the Superior General, the Assistants General, General Secretary and Treasurer, the Provincials of Spain, Italy, Europe- Atlantic, Japan, Argentina-Uruguay, Peru-Bolivia, Colombia-Panama, Ecuador, USA; Vice Provincials of Chile and the Philippines, and the Regional Superiors of India and Africa. In all, twenty Handmaids are expected to be present.

During the course of their participation, the sisters will reflect on the reconfiguration of the Congregation, including one provincial for the whole of Spain, a new entity made up of what had been the provinces of England, Portugal and the houses in France, and the newly created region of Africa. They are also expected to report about the implementation of the decisions of General Congregation XIX and discuss the state of the Congregation throughout the world.

This is the first time that this periodic gathering will be held in the United States. Having until recently convened only in Rome, the Handmaids saw the value of alternating the location between Rome and other sites. Two earlier Intermediate Meetings were held in Latin America and the Philippines.

Novena to Saint Raphaela Mary

In preparation for celebrating the May 18th Feast Day of Saint Raphaela Mary, the foundress of the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the sisters will offer a novena

beginning Friday, May 9th. The novena will be prayed at the conclusion of daily Vespers (Evening Prayer) through Saturday, May 17th in the chapel at Saint Raphaela Center in Haverford. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed for silent Adoration beginning at 5:00 pm, followed by Vespers at 5:20 pm.



The public is warmly invited to take part in the novena and Adoration. Written petitions may be placed at the statue of Saint Raphaela each day. The chapel at the Center is open every day from 9:00 am to noon for daily Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.
