Remembering Brigid McGarvey, acj



Sister Brigid McGarvey, a member of the Wyncote community of the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus for 44 years, died peacefully at the St. Joseph Manor in Meadowbrook on Wednesday, February 10, 2016. She was 89 years young.

Born in Ireland on December 2, 1926, Sr. Brigid came to the United States as a young religious and began working at the Handmaids'

school in Germantown (Ancilla Domini Academy). In 1972 she came to Wyncote and began working at Ancillae-Assumpta Academy as a preschool teaching aide. Later, she took on the responsibility of preparing lunches for the entire preschool and kindergarten children. In the kitchen, Sr. Brigid was in charge. Her menus rarely varied from week to week, but the students loved her selections. It has been said that of all the wonderful lunches she loving prepared and served to the children, she was most famous for her hotdogs and her macaroni and cheese.

Living a life of simple needs and wants, Sr. Brigid's quiet and gentle demeanor and her unmistakable hospitality were gifts that she brought to her ministry each and every day. She also brought the lilt of her Irish brogue to many a conversation.

A visitation, followed by a Mass of Christian Burial was held at Holy Redeemer St. Joseph Manor, on Monday, February 15, presided by Reverend Timothy Judge. Sr. Sagrario Núñez offered a beautiful tribute in a eulogy of Sr. Brigid. Following the liturgy, the Handmaids processed in unison to Sr. Brigid's interment at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Cheltenham, PA.

We rejoice in the gift of her life and ask all to keep Sr. Brigid, her family, and the Handmaids in your prayers.

University City Hotel, the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus were honored for reaching a milestone and

were celebrated for their 90 years of dedication and service in the United States.

The program for this year's *Journey of Hope* began with a series of interactive displays that chronicled the sisters' nine decade journey. Designed and coordinated by event chairperson Lori Stefanowicz, guests wandered through a maze of artifacts and memorabilia that defined the works and presence of the Handmaids. A video presentation featuring the Aquitana, the ship that carried two sisters from England to begin the USA's first Handmaid ministry in Philadelphia, was just one of the highlights of the exhibits. Guests were pleasantly surprised to learn some of the stories and anecdotes the sisters shared.

Leading up to the event, a "Celebrate the Sisters" initiative was conducted with Jacques and Marie Gordon serving as committee chairs. Over \$75,000 was raised to benefit the sisters in gratitude for the work they have done throughout their ministries.

A silent auction and raffle, coordinated by Debbie Giordano and Susan Singer was also offered throughout the evening. Concluding the *Journey of Hope* was a brief Blessing Service presided by Msgr. Hugh Shields.

Looking Back on the Journey

ust as the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus was founded by two women, Raphaela Mary Porras and her sister, Dolores, the first community of Handmaids in the United States was also begun by two women: Virginia Vivanco and Gabriela Dillon. Joining them shortly after their arrival to the USA, were sisters from Havana, Cuba and others from throughout Europe. This group of pioneers worked tirelessly in promoting the education of young women, and by 1928, there were over two hundred University students and one hundred business women enrolled in classes that offered instruction in sewing, art, music, typing, English, and Spanish.

1928 also marked the year that Marie McKeown and Mary Brennan, the first two American women who entered the Handmaid novitiate in Rome. Throughout their twenty years in West Philadelphia, the Handmaids, in addition to their ministry of education, were also deeply committed to Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, days of recollection, and sacramental preparation for entrance into the Church. In a short time, they were joined by additional sisters from South America and Europe, and gradually, the Institute grew, spreading beyond 34th Street, which closed in 1945.

It was then that the Handmaids moved to Wyncote, and in the years that followed, added communities in Germantown and Haverford. In Germantown, the sisters conducted Ancilla Domini Academy, and in 1957, the sisters opened Blessed Raphaela Mary Retreat House in Haverford. In the years that followed, the Handmaids heeded their mission by going "wherever they were needed" to establish additional ministries. This led them to Kimberton, PA; Baltimore, MD; Atlanta, GA; and Beaumont, TX. Today the Handmaids maintain five ministries in the US and a mission in El Salvador.
