

### Newly Selected USA Provincial Superior Named

Sister Inmaculada Fukisawa, Superior General of the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, recently announced the appointment of Sister Belen Escauriaza as the new Provincial Superior of the United States Province. She will replace Sister Dorothy Beck, who has served in this capacity since 2009.





Sister Belen is expected to begin her new role on June 12, the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She, along with a team of consultors, will be responsible for the thirty-seven sisters who live and work in the United States. We wish Sr. Belen much love and support as she continues to fulfill God's will for her vocation.

# Planning Process Concludes

he Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus recently completed a two-year discernment and planning process during which time they studied the current status of their ministries and the ways in which they might better address the needs of the people they serve. The process was facilitated by Sisters Janet Baker, RSM and Christine McCann, RSM, who directed the sisters to reflect on their gifts and talents, energies and passions for ministry, and their desires for the future and previous experiences on which the Province might build. At the conclusion of the process, the Handmaids agreed to address the following with initiatives already underway.

- Continue to deepen the Handmaids Eucharistic and Reparative charism.
- At ANCILLAE-ASSUMPTA ACADEMY, separately incorporate, determine and implement the appropriate governance structure.
- At ST. RAPHAELA CENTER, develop a strategic and financial plan and examine potential expansion and succession planning.
- With young adults, initiate a more intentional commitment, including a
  designated part-time assignment and the use of social media.
- With senior care, evaluate current practices and examine current and new opportunities for long-term care.

Future considerations for the sisters include:

- An openness to potential Province re-configuration.
- A recommendation for the canonical erection of the San Salvador House of the United States Province with the collaboration of Handmaids from other Provinces.
- A further evaluation of the communities and ministries of Philadelphia, Athens, and Miami.

The Handmaid USA Province Advisory Board recently hosted an event to pay tribute to Sister Dorothy Beck, Provincial Superior of the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The celebration was held at Ancillae-Assumpta Academy in Wyncote, PA. Sr. Dorothy, who will be concluding her third term (and a total of eighteen years) as the Province's Superior, was praised for her sixty years of service as a Handmaid, which also encompasses several terms as Community Superior (in Haverford, PA, Miami, FL, and Wyncote, PA.) In addition, Sr. Dorothy served as a teacher at the former Ancilla Domini Academy and at Assumpta Academy, where she was also the principal of the all boys school. Sr. Dorothy served as the initiator and moderator of the ACJ Associates in Wyncote and as the director of the Saint Raphaela Center, a position she currently holds. Beyond the Philadelphia area, Sr. Dorothy served as the director of Religious Education in Broward County, Florida, where she oversaw forty-two parishes and three missions.

A person who, like the Blessed Mother, willingly and without hesitation, said 'Yes' to God's call more than six decades ago. The common thread that weaves the two will certainly be the immeasurable respect, admiration, and love everyone has for her." Ernie Beck, the eldest of Sr. Dorothy's brothers, was the first to address the audience. He was followed by Sr. Kathleen Helbig, Ancilla Domini Academy '60, Donald Amato, Assumpta Academy '65, Anita Alvaré, former Advisory Board chairperson, Dan Murray, Ancillae-Assumpta Academy '77, Reverend Thomas Higgins, and Sr. Jessica Kerber. Each speaker articulated with heartfelt sentiment their memories and reflections of Sr. Dorothy — the ways in which her influence was felt — how she made a difference — what she meant to them at some juncture of their lives. There were tears and laughter, as details

of poignant messages were interspersed with humorous recollections. Everyone, it seemed, had a story to share as hundreds of experiences and sentiments were recounted throughout the afternoon.

A beautifully planned reception catered by Beth Conroy and Conroy Catering, was preceded by a champagne toast offered by Chuck Minnich, Ancillae-Assumpta Academy '81. As each attendee raised a glass, Sr. Dorothy was celebrated "with love and for love" in gratitude for her life and for all that she has shared. We remain eternally grateful

# Oasis Católico - Healing Hearts

The double wide trailer parked in the lot of Pinewood Estates North mobile home park isn't much, but it is home to three Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Oasis Católico Santa Rafaela, named for the foundress of their congregation, is also a place of refuge and support where people who live side-by-side with the sisters can come day or night.

According to Sister Margarita Martin, she and Sisters Marietta Jansen and Angela Cordero arrived in 2002 and quickly became teachers, advocates, and friends to the immigrant population who also call the place "home". "We didn't come with a job description. We just came to be because of the families

in need." It is estimated that about 74 percent of families with children under 5 years old who live in the park are below the poverty level, compared to 22 percent in Georgia. Nearly all are from Latin America, especially Mexico. "The residents here are the people of God whose hearts are really broken," Sister Margarita shares, "and the Handmaid mission is healing hearts."

Their daily work is supported largely through the University of Georgia, who co-sponsor an after school tutoring program for the children. Their work has grown to include additional service projects and is offered to University students



Jesus said, "The poor will be with you always." In parts of Philadelphia, this has been confirmed time and time again. And so it was on Sunday, May 3, 2015.

In celebration of the "Year of Consecrated Life", young adults were invited to join sisters of various congregations in serving the needs of the people in the Kensington area of Philadelphia. Sister Carmen Cabrejos, acj, was one of the volunteers who spent the afternoon sharing her loving hands and heart with the Kensington community. After a blessing at the Community Center at Visitation, groups of volunteers were dispersed to various sites. They returned to the Center for prayer and sharing at the conclusion of their afternoon's work.

from other states. In recent years, the sisters have been joined by undergraduate and graduate students from Villanova University in Pennsylvania who take part in a spring service project. From tutoring third graders to doing home repairs, the volunteers pitch in by painting the trailers, clearing outdoor debris, sometimes just being with the residents. What they glean from their venture cannot be taught in a classroom situation. "It was an eye-opening experience," one volunteer commented.

When asked about any challenges that may have occurred, another volunteer offered, "I was working with a girl who came into the classroom and put her head down and started crying. She was scared for her parents who were being taken by immigration authorities." Another commented, "The biggest challenge for me has been controlling my emotions. My heart hurts so much for these people."

In reflecting on the experiences they had through being tutors, one student

remarked, "I learned the power of patience and looking past the surface. These kids are going through so much — more than I ever have — and I needed to constantly remind myself of that." Finally, one student summed it up like this, "Tutoring the children reminded me that they are

the future, the hope for their families, and because of that we need to provide them with the best education and resources possible so that they have a chance of overcoming the barriers of being children of immigrants."

Surely, the Handmaids would agree.

#### REWARD YOURSELF BY GIVING TO OTHERS

The concept of giving to others and the rewards it offers is not revolutionary. In Chapter 6, Verse 38 of scripture, Luke tells us: "Give and it will be given to you." Proverbs 22:9 reiterates the same message, "He who is generous will be blessed." Charity, whether it is in the form of doing for others or giving to others continues to be a God-given responsibility and a God-driven act.

A recent study conducted by Harvard Business School faculty and graduate students titled, "Feeling Good About Giving" explored the ways in which charitable behavior can lead to benefits for the giver. Besides the tax deduction, the results determined that the motivation and benefits can include the psychological, spiritual, and emotional well-being of the donor.

One longtime friend of the Handmaids said this about making an annual contribution to the sisters, "The Handmaids have ALWAYS been a source of strength and support to my family and me. If giving to them helps make a difference in what they can do for others, it is the least I can do."
