Dear Friends,

"Be still and know that I am God." This simple but profound sentiment expresses my deepest and most heartfelt belief. In the past seven months of chaotic and unpredictable events brought about through the global COVID-19 Pandemic, I continue to hold firm to trusting in the infinite wisdom, mercy, and justice of our Creator. I remind myself daily, "Be still. Listen to the inner voice that compels us to pay attention to one another. Be still. Hear the whispers that give us strength and courage and faith. Be still. Know that you are never alone, no matter how isolated and removed you may feel. Be still and embrace the stillness with hope."

A very brief recap of the state of the Handmaid USA Province finds us in a situation that we have never previously experienced. Our ministries continue to struggle with the difficulties that have presented themselves as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic. We were mandated to close the doors to our school in Wyncote and jump head first into virtual teaching and learning; we were forced to cancel all of our retreats and programs at Saint Raphaela Center and have not had an income at the Center since March, 2020. Our sisters who serve the public from our ministries in Philadelphia, Haverford, Miami, and Athens have had very limited access to those who depend on them. In short, we are struggling.

This pandemic has taken a significant toll on our revenue sources. Income, fees for service, and fundraising endeavors are suffering. Contributions to our annual fund are down by more than 50% and our grant-seeking endeavors have seen a drop of \$50,000 from our previous fiscal year. All of this having been mentioned, you will see through the pages of this report the efforts our sisters have made and are continuing to make in order to move forward. Undoubtedly you will also see the outpouring of support we have received from you, our friends and supporters. Though the numbers may be down, our spirits are lifted.

With little time for preparation, we have had to use our resources wisely. And we have had to trust God amid the confusing world in which we are living. In many ways, despite the hardships, it has been a blessing. Through the world's suffering, we see and experience how very intertwined our lives are, and we have come to more deeply appreciate the fragility and preciousness of life and good health.

I ask as you review this Annual Report to consider the works of the sisters and those we serve. I ask you also to stay connected with us. Despite our need to follow the rules for physical distance today, I pray that we can and will stay connected and united in our hearts, and that in the near future we will once again be able to enjoy a loving embrace and a warm handshake.

Knowing that our financial picture has suffered, we are keenly aware that yours may have suffered, as well. And yet, we know that some have not felt a financial hardship. With this in mind, should you find it possible to make a gift to the Handmaids, please know how deeply appreciative we would be. Your commitment to our mission and ministries has never been as critical as it is at this moment. We are profoundly grateful for your trust, your goodwill, and your willingness to walk in solidarity with us. We could not embark on this journey without you. Please know that you remain in our prayers.

While the COVID-19 pandemic has created isolation, job loss, and increased health concerns, the Handmaid community in Athens, Georgia, has expanded its mission to assist those who are suffering from the effects of this unwelcome and deadly virus.

In partnership with the Georgia Department of Public Health, the sisters have hosted four COVID-19 testing times at Oasis Católico Santa Rafaela. The last one had more than one hundred people receiving a test. According to statistics from the department, Clarke County, which encompasses Athens, had registered nearly 5,000 cases of those infected by the virus throughout September.

Also meeting with many different Latino groups and Clarke County government agencies, the sisters have evaluated and planned ways to collaborate and offer assistance during this pandemic. Among the many concerns facing their community — tenant rights and eviction, education, and limited health resources, food insecurity topped the list.

As a result, the sisters' monthly food distribution has doubled from once to twice a month and on average provide more than 10,000 pounds of food to about one hundred families within the Athens area. That amount



of food is enough to feed four hundred and fifty people, two thirds of whom are children. The sisters have continued their twice weekly egg distribution and have coordinated with volunteer families who provide and deliver sandwiches and the other food staples. The sisters emergency food shelves are stocked with rice and beans for those in urgent need.

For those individuals and families who have contracted the virus, as well as those who have been directly affected through job loss, the Handmaids have offered financial support through providing assistance with rental payments and utility bills.

As the school year commenced, Clarke County School District announced that its students would begin school virtually. Nearly 10% of the



families at Oasis do not have access to the internet, and as a result, the Handmaids are advocating for these students so that the district will provide them with hotspots. Additionally, the sisters at Oasis have made Wi-Fi available to the students during the day and have extended its Wi-Fi coverage to reach the parking lot and halfway to its soccer field. This allows for the sisters to provide space for outdoor classes and a way to safely help children who have technical problems with their devices or connectivity.

Instead of in-person tutoring, Oasis has begun to offer virtual support to its students. In its first two weeks of opening its fall registration, the program has had more than 130 volunteers from the University of Georgia sign up to be tutors.

While the challenges of the Coronavirus Pandemic

continue and will be felt far into the coming months, the Handmaids remain steady in their support and true to their mission in "offering all that we are and have" to the people of God. As Pope Francis reminded in his September 16th general audience address, "To emerge from a pandemic, we need to look after and care for each other. Caring is a golden rule of our nature as human beings."

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**COVID-19** Response

### "The teaching in our schools is more than a profession; it is a priestly function."

After closing its doors and undertaking virtual learning in March, 2020, the Handmaid school in Wyncote set out to handle the challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic by instituting rigorous guidelines and procedures in order to be poised to reopen in September.

To begin their work, school administrators established a Pandemic Response Task Force, made up of volunteer medical, legal, and business leaders from within the community to address the best way to safely bring students and teachers back to campus.

Consistent with the guidance from the <u>American Academy</u> <u>of Pediatrics</u>, and following the Pennsylvania Department of Education Phased School Reopening Health and Safety Plan, the school embarked on a vigorous effort to restructure its physical teaching spaces and health initiatives. Among the key elements are:

- facilities cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting, and ventilation;
- safety protocols including masking, social distancing, restricting use of congregate settings, hygiene practices;
- monitoring student and staff health.

All of these measures are congruent with the Handmaid philosophy of education and address the three pillars of the school's



educational foundation: academic excellence, differentiated instruction, and collaboration in teaching and learning.

Recognizing that the commitment to educating the whole child goes well beyond the academic experience, the school is dedicated to serving the social, emotional, psychological, and spiritual needs of its students. It is believed that this is best achieved by bringing students back to campus and safeguarding them with good health and safety protocols. While the school looks forward to in-person teaching and learning, it has offered the provision of virtual learning to those families who prefer it.

The efforts being made will have other challenges and may not be perfect. But they are well worth the benefits of seeing the happy faces of students as they learn, laugh, and live together again in the AAA community.

Expecting in an Unexpected Time

How Sister Cam Banh Supports Pregnant Women During the Pandemic

Ask any woman who has given birth to describe her feelings during pregnancy and you will get a barrage of responses from euphoria to emotional upheaval - and everything in between. Those days and months spent waiting for a precious new arrival are oftentimes accompanied by a multitude of questions and concerns that arise, and add to a certain sense of nervousness and apprehension.

As a pregnancy counselor and social worker at the Archdiocese of Philadelphia Catholic Social Services/Family Services, Sister Cam Banh knows all too well the familiar scenario of expectant mothers. Working in two locations, Holy Redeemer School and St. Thomas Aquinas Church/School, she is responsible for meeting with women whose pregnancies include not only the typical pre-natal concerns, but oftentimes other life challenges, as well.

Many of her clients are immigrants who do not currently have legal status; some are single mothers. But for Sr. Cam, her greatest concern is that regardless of the mother's situation she has access to good health care in order to give birth to a healthy baby.

In March, 2020, everything took a turn and Sr. Cam was no longer able to meet in-person and advise her caseload of expectant mothers. With the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic, offices were closed, and Sr. Cam had to resort to working remotely from home. "I made



a lot of phone calls primarily to encourage my clients to keep their medical appointments," she recalls. "Most of them asked if I could be present with them and obviously, I agreed. It was important that they have me available to assist with language translation and to provide moral support."

The pandemic added to the fears of any expectant mother. What happens to my baby if I get the virus? The hesitation and panic of leaving the home and going outside or coming into contact with a person carrying the virus contributed to an increase in their anxiety.

But additionally, because of their extenuating circumstances - the inability to work; the inability to collect unemployment insurance; being disqualified for emergency medical assistance due to an absence of proof of income — added to the level of stress many were experiencing.

According to Sr. Cam, "My level of stress also rose. The problems these women were facing contributed to my anxiety to try to figure out how to assist them. *I found myself spending hours* on the phone trying to reassure them, consoling them, and offering whatever type of support they seemed to need." In early April, Sr. Cam began attending the prenatal health care appointments with her clients. Having her present allayed their fears and allowed them to feel "not alone." As she listened patiently and with compassionate understanding, Sr. Cam found herself united in love and trust with scores of vulnerable women

Ever mindful of the Handmaid mission and vision, Sr. Cam embraced the difficulty of her tasks with hope and hospitality, and with the knowledge of God's infinite mercy, grace, and kindness. And while there were times when answers were not always readily available, Sr. Cam stayed faithful and gave to those in her care the hope and promise of a future beyond the pandemic and with the joy of a new life they had been called to bear.

# Coping With the Pandemic in Bolivia

Nhan Nguyen is a novice with the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, USA Province. Living in the novitiate in Bolivia for the past year, Nhan has experienced the COVID-19 pandemic situation with many of the same mandates and prohibitions that have been in place in the United States. She reports that on March 12, 2020, the President of Bolivia announced a national quarantine, followed by the cancellation of all flights, the suspension of all school classes and all private and public transportation, and the prohibition of public gatherings, liturgical celebrations, and all other church activities. Stay-at-home measures were set in place and a mandate including social distancing, and the use of masks and alcohol spray in public were implemented. Additionally, in the Handmaid community the sisters added their own protective measures — among them disinfecting (changing clothes, shoes, and showering) before entering the house and decontaminating all foods and bags brought from the outside.

United in mission with the Bolivia-Peru province and the Institute, the community in Cochabamba sponsors Iriandes, a school (Kindergarten -grade 12), a retreat house, and the family ACJ. These apostolic works have filled the sisters with joy in service of the people and in the evangelization of the Good News. Once the quarantine began, their ministries were severely impacted. Sr. Nhan explains, *"It felt so strange to be at a distance with one another and with such limited physical contact. We witnessed the quick spread of virus and the increase in the number of contaminated cases and deaths. We saw firsthand the economic crisis (no jobs, no money, no food), and the lack of medical services and attention. Our sisters were desperate to help and felt more than ever the need to offer support and to accompany those who had been most affected by the pandemic. Despite many limitations, difficulties, and fears, we looked for a possible way to reach out to others, to continue our mission, and to seek and respond to God's presence and Christ's mission in all things." There have been many challenges, but the sisters have managed to find innovative solutions to continue their work. Here are a few examples:* 

#### CHALLENGE

We were forced to stop going to Las Lomas, a poor village on the mountain, south of Cochabamba, due to the lockdown restrictions and having no public transportation to get there. As time passed, the situation became worse. People were losing their jobs and income resulting in little or no food on the table daily.

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#### SOLUTION

We couldn't stay still and asked the San Lucas Foundation (a community-based health service in the peri-urban and rural area of Cochabamba) whether they would permit us to travel with them by ambulance to Las Lomas. They agreed, but only one person was permitted to accompany their team of the doctors. On the first trip, one of our sisters, Stefanny Coronel, was able to get to Las Lomas and brought with her money to distribute to those in need. While the doctors saw their patients, she hiked her way to the families. Having less than two hours to accomplish her mission, Sr. Stefanny realized it was not enough. A second plan

was then devised. After searching through different means we managed to arrange for a commander of the Cochabamba Navy to assist us. This time we were able to have four novices who were armed with dozens of food bags plus money. The food bags we had prepared contained rice, noodles, and vegetables and fruits from our own little farm.

#### CHALLENGE

For the most part we have been unable to offer retreats at our retreat house, although we were happy to serve a small religious community of six sisters and one private retreatant. To do this, we separated our prayer spaces, and redesigned the ways in which clothes were laundered and meals were prepared and served.

#### SOLUTION

Eventually, our retreat house was able to be "repurposed" offering a safe haven for a family beseiged by a domestic violence situation. A woman called us for help because her husband had wounded her several times with a knife in an attempt to kill her. We were able to provide a safe place to care for the family for two weeks before they were able to shelter at a center that helps those dealing with domestic violence. During this time, the mother learned how to read, how to write her name, and how to knit. We later created a pandemic project mission in Las Lomas to continue accompanying and helping those who are suffering this type of abuse and have few alternatives.

In a similar situation, the sisters offered a space in the building that housed former novices to a mother (Marisabel) and her two children (José and Paz), because her husband (German) works at a hospital where the cases of COVID-19 are high. For their health and protection from the virus, the family stayed separated from German for more than 4 months, finally returning home when the fear of potential infection had subsided significantly.

#### CHALLENGE

In Bolivia, the school year runs from February to the first week of December. Our school was closed in March due to the pandemic, just a month after we opened for the year.

#### SOLUTION

Despite the difficulties of not having consistent internet access, the resignation of some teachers, and some parental complaints, we successfully managed to have all virtual classes for our students. Together with the community, we have accompanied and listened to our professors and staff members through meetings and phone calls. Desiring to bring Christ to the homes of the families of our school, we discerned the ways to accompany the educational community. The idea of broadcasting adorations, prayer services, and Eucharistic celebrations through Facebook, Zoom, or Meet was born, and we began broadcasting Adoration on Facebook every Thursday. We have invited the Little Worshipers — those at the primary level and their families to participate in our Adoration with the slogan *"In this quarantine we are all Little Worshipers"*. Later, we changed the transmission from Facebook to Zoom, which allows children to interact during the Adoration.

When many parents could no longer afford to pay for their children's tuition and protested that the tuition be reduced by 50%, the sisters and the school managed to find a way to pay our professors and staff members on time. As a result, the school debt has increased each month and we are faced with major financial problems.



Making matters worse, suddenly, on August 2nd, the Bolivian government announced the closure of the 2020 school year for both public and private education. Chaos ensued and many private schools declared an emergency closing down their



schools due to their inability to cover administrative costs and teachers' salaries. However, the sisters could not abandon the professors and staff members (whom they regard as family) and within a week of the closure announcement, they called for the meeting with their school administration and all the professors, looking for an alternative way to continue virtual learning. During the meeting, both the administrators and professors agreed to share a portion of their income with the school service staff members who are not able to work. The sisters were obviously happy to witness such a gesture of solidarity among the school personnel and created a new program with all courses for all grade levels. They began classes, but need an additional two hundred students to register in order to pay the minimum salaries for professors and staffs. The sisters are determined not to lose hope. For the novice Nhan, the image of the boat facing the storm (Matthew 8:23-

27) comes to mind. "We are all in the same boat, facing the storm, but Jesus also is there with us. Jesus said, 'You of little faith, why are you so afraid?' As we walk by faith and trust that God is accompanying us, all we can do is to hold tight to our faith and walk together with Jesus through the storm."

Throughout the pandemic, the sisters have had the unbridled support of the Family ACJ — those who walk with faith with the Handmaids; those who have unselfishly offered food, clothing, and other necessities to their neighbors as needed. United in prayer and apostolic work, these faithful members share in the Handmaid mission not only in service, but also in spirit.

In summing up the pandemic and its effects on the Bolivian community in Cochabamba, Nhan recognizes that the quarantine situation moved the sisters to react quickly in response to the community's needs. Developing plans and solutions and thinking "outside of the box" were essential to their apostolic work — work that has filled them with joy in service of the people and in the evangelization of the Good News. Missing the physical closeness of the community continues to be a great hardship for the sisters, who so lovingly want to embrace their community not only offering help, but hugs. As Nhan states, "We work and entrust all members of the community into the hands of God, in action and in prayer. Through our apostolic works, in our community life, and in our daily adoration, we are able to live the Eucharist more vividly."

# Core Values

The Handmaids' response to the abject poverty in El Salvador and the now present-day reality due to the COVID-19 pandemic is rooted in the core values that Saint Raphaela Mary and her sister instilled in the Community over one hundred and forty years ago. From the time they were children, the Handmaid foundress and her sister, Dolores, learned from their parents that in blessing others with works of mercy, they in turn were blessed. This labor of love continues to the present day through the commitment that the Handmaids have in El Salvador through Project FIAT.

Out of the realization that public transportation halted and the President's mandatory in house quarantine to the entire country of El Salvador moved us to take action in a variety of ways. The first action was to continue providing the volunteer house employees with their full salary, even though they were unable to work. We also wanted to come to the aid of the other non-full time workers who rely solely on the presence of the Project FIAT volunteers as their only means of support. Every fifteen days we arrange for these workers to receive a modest stipend along with



rice, beans, sugar, and corn meal to help alleviate some of their suffering through these difficult times. In addition, private transportation is arranged for the two volunteer house watchmen

who take turns working four straight 24 hour shifts.

Another important work of mercy dear to the hearts of the Handmaids is education. This is evident in our cooperation with the school in Las Delicias as we support the teachers and children with books, study aids, materials and tutors. We also share the frustration of the parents and students alike as they struggle to learn virtually



under difficult circumstances such as lack of internet and audio visual equipment. Students left on their own to learn has been increasingly challenging and resulting in many abandoning their education.



s the Handmaids continue their work in El Salvador, there remains a gratitude to all donors contributing to facilitate these community responses, in particular, the response towards

the food program. Due to the COVID-19 restrictions, the food program was unable to continue providing hot meals. Thanks to the financial support of our donors, we have extended the food program to include as many as ninety men, women, and children. Every fifteen days volunteers from the village of Las Delicias prepare bags of needed staples which are then distributed to those participating in the program.

As the Handmaids continue to respond to the COVID-19 crisis in El Salvador may God bless them with graced energy and fortitude as they go forward in this labor of love.

### Sister Marietta Jansen and Sister Margarita Martin

Sisters Marietta Jansen and Margarita Martin, along with Sister Angela Cordero, were missioned to Athens, GA in September, 2002 to respond to the needs of a community of Latino immigrants. In the ensuing years, the sisters offered a loving environment trying to live out the Handmaid Charism of "healing hearts" to those in need and the most vulnerable among us. To that end, an outreach center was created. "Oasis Católico Santa Rafaela" has become a beacon of light for the community. Beyond offering support, advocacy in the city and state, and basic necessities to the more than two thousand who live in the trailer park and those within a 50 mile radius, Religious Education in the Parish and Student Catholic Center was also provided. Partnering with the University of Georgia, they established a tutoring program for the children in the community having more than 3,576 tutors who offered 90,467 hours of service throughout the 18 years. In June, 2020, the sisters were missioned to other Handmaid communities: Sr. Marietta to Wyncote and Sr. Margarita to Miami.

The **National Religious Retirement Office** provided a grant of \$44,916.79 for retired sisters.


