

### Handmaids to Leave Philadelphia

After a ninety-five year presence in the city of brotherly love, the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus will be closing the community that has spanned from West Philadelphia to Germantown to Kensington and finally to South Broad Street in South Philadelphia. The announcement was made by Sister Belén Escauriaza, and as might be expected, was greeted with a degree of sadness and disappointment. For many in the Handmaid community today, as well as many deceased sisters, Philadelphia represents the place they became aware of the Handmaid congregation which ultimately led to their call to religious life.


Arriving from Spain in April, 1926, the first Handmaids established a small chapel and began teaching classes in fine arts, sewing, and languages to young women and children on 34th Street. Their commitment to education prompted the beginning of Ancilla Domini Academy (ADA), an elementary school in Germantown. The school expanded to offer classes for girls in grades 9 through 12, and remained operational until its closing in 1976. Several of the presentday sisters including Kayjoy Cooper, Kathleen Helbig, Gloria Petrone, and Julia Walsh became acquainted with the Handmaids during their high school years at ADA, as did the late Sr. Elizabeth McCoy.

After the close of ADA, and always seeking ways to service the ever growing influx of immigrants, the sisters began outreaching and evangelizing to those in the Kensington section of Philadelphia. They moved to a location on 2nd Street and in cooperation with several of the local parishes including St. Michael's, St. Peter the Apostle, and St. Veronica's, offered assistance to the poor and disenfranchised. Two new locations followed; the first on North 17th Street and finally the location on South Broad Street in South Philadelphia, where they ministered to the parishioners at St. Thomas Aquinas, Annunciation, Our Lady of Hope, Visitation, Holy Redeemer, and Old St. Joseph Church.

The diversity of the sisters in nationality and experiences provided a unique opportunity for them to serve the English, Cambodian, Vietnamese, Chinese, and Spanish populations of innercity Philadelphia. Additionally, throughout the years several of the sisters worked for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia's Catholic Social Services in a number of capacities that directly assisted the immigrant population.

While in Philadelphia, the sisters also established a Mission Center, which eventually saw to the creation of Project Fiat in El Salvador, a project that remains active today.

Although the physical presence of the Handmaids will no longer be a part of Philadelphia, their impact will long be felt by those whose lives they touched and those on whose journey they were a companion, mentor, and friend.

# The Journey of Hope

These are the faces of the thirty Handmards of the Sacred Heart of Jesus who make up the USA Province today. Their smiles radiate with joy, hospitality, compassion, humility, and simplicity - reflections of the core values that represent their congregation. The sisters' ages span seven decades - from twenty-three to ninety-three and hail from countries across the globe, including Spain, Vietnam, Perú, Cuba, Columbia, Taiwan, and the United States. Half of them have been fully professed women religious for at least fifty years and when asked will tell you that they never looked back. Their dedication and commitment underscore the ways in which they serve, and remain open to the challenges of today's world. While their US Province is relatively small in size by most standards, the Handmaids maintain a presence in twenty-four countries in Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Americas.

A multi-cultural representation of their commitment to the mission and ministry of their foundress, the sisters celebrated the 2021 *Journey of Hope*, a virtual event, held on April 28th. The theme of this year's program focused on *Stories that Inspire* and featured personal reflections from the sisters, volunteers, friends, and those served by the Handmaids through several of their ministries including Oasis Catolico, the Saint Raphaela Center, and Project Fiat in El Salvador. The event also offered a segment highlighting one of the two nonagenarians, Sr. María Jesús Sagaseta, and the newest postlant, Lauren Serfas, as they provided a glimpse of some of the contrasts and similarities of religious life through the years. The evening's special guests included Philadelphia's Archbishop Nelson Perez, who offered a greeting and Reverend James Martin, SJ, whose description and discussion about prayer was insightful and inspiring, with many revelations and practical advice from his newest publication, *Learning to Pray: A Guide for Everyone*.

# Takes Another Step

Attendees to this first-time virtual event hailed from across the United States, as well as Europe and Canada. The Journey of Hope, which is promoted as an annual Handmaid friend raiser and fund raiser, had over two thousand (2,081) visitors to its event page and five hundred and forty who could be counted among those who viewed the event. The number is most likely higher as many of the viewers were part of a "watch party" or gathered with family members to take part. The data also shows that the Advertisement and Program book, featured at the end of the event and also with a separate link, resulted in 1,200 views. A video of the event will remain available following the April 28th presentation.

As a primary fund raiser of the Handmaid Province, the *Journey of Hope* nearly reached its \$100,000 goal, with 185 contributors donating a total of \$97,250.00.

While the statistics and numbers are important, more compelling are the comments of those who are usually unable to attend the in-person gatherings held since 2010. One viewer commented, "I was overjoyed to be able to see the sisters and learn how they are still impacting the lives of so many." Another remarked, "Last night was wonderful from beginning to end. Congratulations." And yet another simply stated, "God bless the sisters and all their works!"

It is the last comment that sums up the ever-present belief and hope that keeps the sisters driven to fulfill their mission. Indeed God has blessed them with a determination that keeps them going tirelessly, despite any obstacle or impediment. Their work today reflects the ability to embrace the changes and directions in which they are being led, as they continue to be the beacons of hope in an evolving world.
